He was parish clerk of Meifod and is said to have died in the almshouse about 1750. His most popular poem, 'Cerdd y Winllan,' together with two others, 'Ystyriaeth ar fyrdra oes dyn ' and 'Cerdd ar Ymadawiad Pachadur (sic) ai Oferedd ', were included by David Jones of Trefriw in his Blodeu-Gerdd, 1759. He wrote in a serious vein, chiefly on religious themes. It was he who taught his vicar, Salisbury Pryce, to read Welsh.
