



HUGHES, WILLIAM (died 1794?), clock-maker in London

A native of Llanfflewin, Anglesey, he proceeded to London before 1755 and had a business at 119, High Holborn. He was elected a honorary Freeman of the Worshipful Company of Clockmakers in 1781. A musical watch which he made for the Emperor of China was discovered during the sacking of Peking in 1860. He was in business until 1794 at the Dial near King Street, High Holborn, and also at Lower Grosvenor Street.

Hughes was a member of the Cymmrodorion Society from the very start, and a vice-president in 1759. He was a friend of [Robert Hughes](#) (1744 - 1785). See *Cymm.*, 1951, 65 (and appendices) and *Bulletin of the Board of Celtic Studies*, vi, 234.
